Failure to meet health needs of people with learning disabilities

Investigators say the NHS and social services in England are failing to meet the health needs of people with learning disabilities.

The Health Service and Local Government Ombudsmen reviewed the deaths of 6 people with a learning disability which were highlighted in Mencap's Death by Indifference report.

The Health Ombudsman's report revealed 'significant and distressing failures' in health and social care services. People with a learning disability experienced 'prolonged suffering and poor care.'

"The quality of care in the NHS and social services for people with learning disabilities is at best patchy and at worst an indictment of our society," said Health Ombudsman Ann Abraham.

The government has promised to improve training and carry out a full inquiry into premature deaths among people with learning disabilities.

Care services minister Phil Hope said: "Preventable deaths of people with learning disabilities are absolutely unacceptable."

Mencap Chief Executive Mark Goldring added: "Although the reports are a big step forward for people with a learning disability, it is not the end of the journey for all the families. We will continue to fight for justice for the families."

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How do you want to live your life?

Watford Mencap has been awarded funding to progress our work in giving people with learning disabilities and their families a greater say on how money is spent on services in Hertfordshire.

The grant from the Joint Commissioning Team - which is funded by Hertfordshire County Council and Primary Care Trust - means Watford Mencap is now a lead partner in the Strengthening User and Carer Involvement pilot project.

Our New Solutions team will co-ordinate local activities specifically for South West Hertfordshire so we can consult with people with learning disabilities. This will give us a greater understanding of how they want to be supported to live their lives, and how they would like health and social care funding to be spent.

Kathryn White, Development Manager,
Personalisation, Individualised Funding and
Supported Living, said: "We recognise that
people with learning disabilities and their
carers can face many barriers to involvement.
We are working to promote full equality of
opportunity so that people can participate
meaningfully in consultation activities, with the
level of involvement that they choose."

Jan Gates of the Joint Commissioning Team added: "Together we plan to come up with some innovative new ways of how we can work with people and give them the opportunity to influence where money is spent on services in social care and in health care."

The aim is to draw up proposals on a way forward by the end of the year.

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It's the credit crunch

- what can we do?

Local firms are cutting back on staff and people we know are losing their jobs. Watford Mencap is feeling the pinch as business sponsors pull out, and donors find it hard to maintain their giving.

However the needs of people with a learning disability and their families have not gone away. Our services have never been more necessary.

How can we help families?

- Our Advice and Advocacy Service can help you with benefits and other financial problems
- We provide respite through our Leisure Together, Children's and Community Support Services, relieving stress and helping carers continue working (see opposite: Helping Carers into Work)
- We subsidise support for example a play scheme place costs us £58 per day, but we only charge £15
- We provide volunteering opportunities as a stepping-stone to work, or a chance to develop new skills after redundancy
- We can advise on Individual Budgets through our New Solutions service



Come and run the Watford 10k





The 2009 Watford 10k Charity Fun Run will take place on Bank Holiday Monday 4 May and help raise money for Watford Mencap and Watford Round Table.

The race - which includes 1k and 3k fun runs for juniors - begins at Cassiobury Park in Watford. Camelot will be this year's main sponsors.

Last year's 10k race was won by Nigel Rackham, 46, from Pinner who trains 5 days a week. Nigel, pictured, is a director at Pricewaterhouse Coopers in London and occasionally he will even run home from work!

She said: "Having a learning disability shouldn't stop people from running and Watford Mencap do a good job in supporting people to do this."

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Dear Watford Mencap

My wife and I live with our son who has a learning disability. We are finding it increasingly difficult to pay all the household bills and have just received our latest Council Tax bill. Is there any help available?

A household's Council Tax bill is based on at least 2 adults living in a home and it doesn't increase if there are more than 2 adults in the home. However if there is only 1 adult living there the Council Tax is reduced by 25%. This is called the 'Second Adult Rebate.' Certain people are not counted when working out the number of adults who live in your home and this can include people with learning disabilities.

If someone in your household is disabled and needs more space, the disabled band reduction scheme could help you to get a reduction in your Council Tax. If you meet the criteria the banding on your house will be reduced to the level below. If you are on a low income you may qualify for Council Tax Benefit which means that some or all of your Council Tax will be paid.
